THE CHILDREN'S BOOK AWARD IS BACK!

The Children's Book Award 2022 shortlist was announced on 28th February, with children from the 12 Federation testing groups choosing their favourite books from the last two years after a year-long hiatus. The challenges of getting books out to the child judges in lockdowns meant the award did not run last year.

Sarah Stuffins, Children's Book Award Coordinator says: "The challenges of the last few years meant we were unable to run the Children's Book Award last year, but this year the children have had two years' worth of wonderful stories to choose from. We're thrilled to be showcasing their choices in this exciting shortlist that demonstrates the superb talent and creativity in children's books today."





NEW WEBSITE!

We were delighted to welcome **Hilary Robinson** to our AGM on Saturday, 29 January 2022. Hilary is an award-winning author, radio producer and broadcaster, who has written over 70 picture books including the internationally-acclaimed 'Mixed Up Fairy Tales.' As an author, Hilary's awards include the 2016 Historical Young Quills Award for 'Flo of the Somme,' part of a picture book series for which she was also a Carnegie medal nominee. Her radio credits include 'Private Peaceful' for BBC Radio 2, and her series for Barry Humphries 'Forgotten Musical Masterpieces' was listed as one of the top 30 artistic triumphs of 2016 by The Telegraph.

Hilary was talking to us about her 'Poppies' picture books featuring best friends Ray and Ben, during World War I and which are beautifully illustrated by Martin Impey. Martin's video showed us how he builds up his illustrations, from simple pencil lines to the completed pictures. Two of these books are now on the Books For Topics reading list for Key Stage 2 pupils, and would appeal to children from 6 – 12 years old. It was fascinating to learn more about the background to these books and the Great Uncles who inspired Hilary and Martin to produce them. We also had the added treat of a visit by Peace Lily and Ray! With drinks, cakes and book signing included, we had a brilliant morning!

INAUGURAL CHILDREN'S BOOK FESTIVAL

When a new independent book shop opened in Reading just over a year ago, we had no idea what a difference it was going to make to our local Children's Book Group! Luckily, the owner of Fourbears Books, Alex Forbes, was open to ideas, enthusiastic about working together and supportive, and we have been holding a popular monthly book group meeting in the shop since August. By October half-term, we found ourselves helping to organise and run a children's book festival!



We decided to focus on local authors for this first festival and hold all the events in the shop at the beginning of each day by delaying the opening time, except on Monday when we had the whole day as the shop is usually closed. We are lucky to know so many local authors and over six days the programme boasted seven entertaining events featuring A F Harrold, Iszi Lawrence, Tim Tilley, Kate Poels, Holly Webb, Pirate Patch the storyteller and Fiona Barker. Our audiences learned a lot about books written by the speakers and enjoyed some amazing practical workshops.

At the suggestion of **Holly Webb**, we ran a competition inspired by her Museum Kittens series. Our lucky winner won a collection of personally dedicated books and a beautiful piece of original artwork by the books' illustrator **Sarah Lodge**.

Though costly in terms of time, we broke even financially thanks to ticket and book sales, plus some generously modest author fees. It was so rewarding to see our speakers and audiences enjoying live events again! Next time (yes we're already planning!), we hope to condense the programme into a long weekend and accommodate larger audiences by using different venues.










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PLYMOUTH CHILDREN'S BOOK GROUP

The Plymouth Group finally managed to hold an actual AGM after a 2 year delay in January this year at a venue in the Royal William Yard overlooking Plymouth Sound. Tom Palmer was in the city doing workshops in schools so they asked him if he would come along and be guest speaker at this evening event. It was particularly appropriate as his latest book, Arctic Star, featured Plymouth in the story. He was delighted to reunite with a lot of old friends and have the opportunity to talk to a mainly adult audience consisting of other authors and teachers about his latest work.

After refreshments, the evening began with the formal part of the proceedings; accepting reports submitted by the officers of the committee and ratifying their roles and other members within it. Several staff from member schools were present and Libby Allman, the group's CBA coordinator, was able to reassure everyone that book testing is alive and well in Devon. This part of the meeting closed with post it notes being shared for attendees to suggest ideas for future children's book events in the area, making the best use of group funds. These ideas will be considered at the next committee meeting.



Tom Palmer was then introduced by Julia Hale, consultant librarian for Plymouth schools, and, one of the named researchers for Tom's book. He told the audience how his book had come about and how involved he had become in the story. His talk was enhanced by part of an interview he had previously recorded with a WW2 veteran, Rolfe Monteith aged 98, who had been on one of the Arctic Convoys and now lives close by in Plymouth. His voice booming out from the screen certainly evoked some of the horrific experiences at sea endured by the men on board and which Tom so expertly portrays in his book. Unfortunately, Rolfe did not serve for quite long enough to receive an Arctic Star medal awarded to British Commonwealth forces who served on these convoys. However, a Plymouth lady and her daughter had come along with her father's Arctic Star medal which was admired by all, so Tom was thrilled to meet them and hear their story.



Questions at the end encouraged Tom to share details of his writing process and to celebrate the achievements of his publisher Barrington Stoke in their efforts to make the reading process more accessible for those with dyslexia. It was a really emotional evening, enjoyed by all who came along.



PLYMOUTH FOOD BANK

It was decided by the Plymouth Group to donate children's books to a local food bank. One of the helpers there reported that children who came along with their parents are delighted to be able to choose a book for themselves to take home. Other events for the group are in the pipeline; sharing stories in local schools on World Book Day for Plymouth Children in Poverty, and, organising story/activity sessions for children in Keyham (where the shootings took place last year) with funding from Plymouth Together.

to celebrate the paperback publication of her latest novel Song Beneath The Tides. In this, she used her experiences of a childhood in Africa to create an evocative and a resonant sense of place. Young people were invited to think about their special place and to transport readers there by writing about it. The competition was open to pupils in two age categories, 8-11 years and 12 years+ attending a Suffolk school.

The wonderful prizes included critiques of their writing by Beverley, signed books from her publisher Guppy Books and, for the overall winners, a £150 Dial Lane Books voucher for each of their schools generously funded by Beverley herself. The children were not disappointed; Ross performed in his usual theatrical style and, accompanied by Sarah Warburton's brilliant illustrations, he had a class full of little monsters in no time at all. Everyone enjoyed themselves immensely and the follow up work occupied a whole year group for at least a week.

On 23rd November, **Petr Horacek** visited Four Oaks Primary. In the morning he did two sessions which included Reception and all of KS1. The children were completely engaged with 'The Greedy Goat,' 'The Blue Penguin,' 'Silly Suzy Goose' and many more. Petr entertained his audience with his drawings and many funny stories about his grandma, who seemed to have a saying for every situation.

In the afternoon Petr did an Art Workshop with Year One to which every child contributed and had their work displayed on a mural which is now in pride of place in the assembly hall.

Another lovely day confirmed what we already knew: you can't beat having a real live author in school. Let's hope it's just the start of many more visits.
